$$\begin{aligned} 1. K_b &= \frac{K_w}{K_a} \\ &= \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{5.8 \times 10^{-10}} \\ K_b &= 1.7 \times 10^{-5} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} 2. K_a &= \frac{K_w}{K_b} \\ &= \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{1.5 \times 10^{-11}} \\ K_a &= 6.7 \times 10^{-4} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} 1. \text{pH} + \text{pOH} &= 14 \\ \text{pOH} &= 14 - \text{pH} \\ &= 14 - 4 \\ \text{pOH} &= 4 \end{aligned}$$

Required: pH

Analysis: $\text{pH} = -\log[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})]$

Solution: $\text{pH} = -\log(1.8 \times 10^{-9})$
 $= 8.74$

Statement: The solution has a pH of 8.74

2. **Given:** pH = 2.5

Required: $[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})]$

Analysis: $[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})] = 10^{-\text{pH}}$

Solution: $[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})] = 10^{-2.5}$
 $= 3.2 \times 10^{-3}$

Statement: $[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})] = 3.2 \times 10^{-3} \text{ mol/L}$

3. Given: $[\text{OH}^- (\text{aq})] = 3.2 \times 10^{-4} \text{ mol/L}$

Required: pOH

Analysis: $\text{pOH} = -\log[\text{OH}^- (\text{aq})]$

Solution: $\text{pOH} = -\log(3.2 \times 10^{-4})$
 $= 3.49$

Statement: The solution has a pOH of 3.49

4. Given: $[\text{OH}^- (\text{aq})] = 1.0 \text{ mol/L}$

Required: pOH, pH

Analysis: $\text{pOH} = -\log[\text{OH}^- (\text{aq})]$

Solution: $\text{pOH} = -\log(1.0)$
 $= 0$

$$\text{pH} = 14 - \text{pOH} = 14$$

Statement: The solution has a pOH of 0.00 and a pH of 14.00

2. $\text{Cl}^- < \text{F}^- < \text{NO}_2^- < \text{CN}^-$

3. $K_b = \frac{K_w}{K_a}$

(a) $K_b = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{1.8 \times 10^{-4}} = 5.6 \times 10^{-11}$

(b) $K_b = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{4.4 \times 10^{-7}} = 2.3 \times 10^{-8}$

(c) $K_b = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{3.8 \times 10^{-8}} = 2.9 \times 10^{-7}$

(b) $[OH^-(aq)]$: 1.0×10^{-15} mol/L; acidic

6. Given: pH

Required: $[H^+(aq)]$, $[OH^-(aq)]$

Analysis: $[H^+(aq)] = 10^{-\text{pH}}$

$$[OH^-(aq)] = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{[H^+]}$$

(a) $[H^+(aq)]$: 5.9×10^{-4} mol/L; $[OH^-(aq)]$: 1.7×10^{-11} mol/L

(b) $[H^+(aq)]$: 3.8×10^{-14} mol/L; $[OH^-(aq)]$: 2.6×10^{-1} mol/L

(c) $[H^+(aq)]$: 6.0×10^{-3} mol/L; $[OH^-(aq)]$: 1.7×10^{-12} mol/L

(d) $[H^+(aq)]$: 1.1×10^{-9} mol/L; $[OH^-(aq)]$: 8.9×10^{-6} mol/L

7. (a) Given: $[H^+(aq)] = 6.2 \times 10^{-11}$ mol/L

Required: pH

Analysis: $\text{pH} = -\log[H^+(aq)]$

Solution: $\text{pH} = -\log(6.2 \times 10^{-11})$
 $= 10.21$

Statement: The solution has a pH of 10.21.

(b) **Given:** $[OH^-(aq)]$: 7.1×10^{-14} mol/L

Required: pH

Analysis: $[H^+(aq)] = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{[OH^-]}$

$\text{pH} = -\log[H^+(aq)]$

Solution: $[H^+(aq)] = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{7.1 \times 10^{-14}} = 1.41 \times 10^{-1}$ mol/L

$\text{pH} = -\log(1.41 \times 10^{-1})$
 $= 0.85$

Statement: The solution has a pH of 0.85.

(c) **Given:** pOH = 4.98

Required: pH

Analysis: $\text{pH} = 14.00 - \text{pOH}$

Solution: $\text{pH} = 14.00 - 4.98$

Statement: The solution has a pH of 9.02.

8. (a) Given: $[\text{OH}^-(\text{aq})] = 3.1 \times 10^{-4} \text{ mol/L}$

Required: pOH

Analysis: $\text{pOH} = -\log[\text{OH}^-(\text{aq})]$

Solution: $\text{pOH} = -\log(3.1 \times 10^{-4})$
 $= 3.51$

Statement: The solution has a pOH of 3.51.

(b) Given: $[\text{H}^+(\text{aq})] = 1.0 \times 10^{-7} \text{ mol/L}$

Required: pOH

Analysis: $[\text{OH}^-(\text{aq})] = \frac{1.0 \times 10^{-14}}{[\text{H}^+]}$

$\text{pOH} = -\log[\text{OH}^-(\text{aq})]$

Solution: $[\text{OH}^-(\text{aq})] = 1.0 \times 10^{-14} / 1.0 \times 10^{-7} = 1.0 \times 10^{-7}$

$\text{pOH} = -\log(1.0 \times 10^{-7})$
 $= 7.00$

Statement: The solution has a pOH of 7.00.

(c) Given: $\text{pH} = 3.84$

Required: pOH

Analysis: $\text{pOH} = 14.00 - \text{pH}$

Solution: $\text{pH} = 14.00 - 3.84$
 $= 10.16$

Statement: The solution has a pOH of 10.16.

9. [H⁺(aq)] = 10^{-pH}

[OH⁻(aq)] = 10^{-pOH}

[H⁺(aq)] [OH⁻(aq)] = 1.0 × 10⁻¹⁴

(a) [H⁺]: 1.00 × 10⁻¹² mol/L; [OH⁻]: 1.0 × 10⁻²

(b) [H⁺]: 2.88 × 10⁻² mol/L; [OH⁻]: 3.5 × 10⁻¹³

(c) [H⁺]: 1.00 × 10⁻³ mol/L; [OH⁻]: 1.0 × 10⁻¹¹

(d) [H⁺]: 4.90 × 10⁻¹⁰ mol/L; [OH⁻]: 2.0 × 10⁻⁵

10. This statement is not true because it is the concentration of hydrogen ions that makes an acid dangerous, not the strength of the acid. A dilute solution of a strong acid has a low concentration of hydrogen ions.

11. A superacid is an acid that has a greater tendency to donate protons than pure sulfuric acid does. Some superacids are molecules that lose protons easily; others are manufactured by adding sulfur or nitrogen oxides to concentrated sulfuric or nitric acids. They are extremely corrosive and can cause severe skin damage. Superacids are used as catalysts in chemical manufacturing.
